Dear Friends,

Did you ever hear somebody say something like, "I have one of those faces that looks like a lot of other people?" I've received a lot of comments down through the years that have convinced me that apparently I'm also in that situation. When I was in college, my dad sent me a newspaper article about the second(?) Star Trek movie, The Wrath of Khan (the one with Ricardo Montalban). The article had a picture of him in the captain's chair of a space ship. Behind him was his assistant, a young guy – he was my doppelganger... or I was his. Anyway, we looked almost exactly alike, at least in that picture. And my dad was half-wondering if I had been spending my time on some movie set instead of in chem lab.

But, even given those relatively rare sorts of occasions, we humans are unique. We share traits and characteristics and beliefs with other folks, but we still very much our own beings. That's especially true when it comes to the ministries we Christians are called to. Our call to ministry is essentially unique. We have our own situations, experiences, spiritual gifts, abilities, passions, personality, and tolerance for risk. All of these things combine to shape and form us to serve God in a particular way. Our call to ministry is nearly unique.

Because that call is unique to us, our call to ministry pours meaning into our lives. God calls us to a ministry that's uniquely suited to us. So how could our call not produce meaning in us? It's designed to be life-giving.

Some much of life isn't life-giving. Our jobs aren't necessarily. Getting older isn't necessarily. Raising families is great, but sometimes such a challenge. And so, to have one thing that's meaningful is a great gift.

So I'd lift up some questions for you to think about.

- * How has God shaped you for ministry?
- * How are you currently serving God? (You don't get to skate by on this one everyone is called to serve in some way).
- * Does the way you're currently serving God give you a sense of meaning?
- * And a question for us as a church: What programs, processes and personnel can we use to help each other figure out what our call to ministry is, and then take up that call?)

It's a privilege to serve Him together in ministry with you.

We're Restructuring Our Consistory

Our consistory has been thinking a lot about how we function. We've been wondering if there's a more effective, efficient way of being the consistory together. Our official structure called for a consistory of 14 people and six committees – too big for a church of our size. Here's what we've come up with.

We will have a consistory of 11 people – the number of elders and deacons will vary according to people's calls. We will have one vice-president, with two consistory members relating to each of five committees.

The committees will be:

- Discipleship (helping all our members adults and children to grow in faith)
- Outreach and Evangelism (assisting our congregation to share the Gospel through overt acts of caring, kindness and invitation)
- Facilities and Finance (supporting our church's ministry by providing human, financial and physical, building resources)
- ♦ **Congregational Care** (fostering loving relationships by demonstrating and practicing the love and care of Christ for each other)
- Worship Committee (providing worship experiences that deepen the congregation's sense of belonging and commitment to Christ and each other).

We have also reduced the length of terms of elders and deacons to two years. It's possible for deacons and elders to serve two consecutive terms before taking a break for at least a year.

We had several months debate as to how to best structure our consistory. We hope and trust that these will be helpful changes.



When Franklin Graham agreed to fill shoeboxes with toys and other fun items for children in wartorn Bosnia in 1993, he had no idea what the project would grow to become. Over the past 30 years, Samaritan's Purse has collected and delivered more than 200 million Operation Christmas Child shoebox gifts, thanks to a church and volunteer network in the U.S. and around the world that is hundreds of thousands strong.

In addition to bringing great joy to millions of boys and girls in need, gifts are accompanied by the Good News of Jesus Christ. Many children have been invited to follow-up discipleship through The Mailbox Club (prior to 2009) and The Greatest Journey, a 12-lesson program designed especially for shoebox recipients. Candy; toothpaste; gum; used or damaged items; scary or war-related items; seeds; food; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items or glass containers; aerosol cans

- Sunglasses
- Jewelry and watches
- Flashlights (with extra batteries)

We have some shoeboxes, which you may pick up to fill, or you can use your own shoebox or plastic container that is the same size as a shoebox.

There are labels for you to pick up—decide if you want to give to a boy or girl, ages 2–4, 5–9, or 10–14, fill your box, and drop it off with your \$10 shipping donation to CCHP no later than November 12th.
