Dear Friends,

For the better part of a year, maybe unbeknownst to you, I've been writing these pastor's letters on the eight guiding principles Scripture gives about who we're to be as the church. These are the same principles that are on the banners in our sanctuary. And this letter brings us to the last one: Boosting Ministry. It's about structures that enable ministry.

Now when we say structures, we're not necessarily talking about buildings. We also mean budgets, funding, rules and bylaws, committees... and of course buildings too.

There's a reason that we're talking about Boosting Ministry/structures last (and they're also listed last in our guiding principles). The reason is that it's too easy to put them first – to make them more important than they ought to be. This is a danger the Christian church falls into all the time. Churches default into a kind of institutionalism all too easily. They make the church about the church instead of about Jesus and the people He calls us to be, and the things He calls us to do. And so the church becomes about budgets, funding, rules and bylaws, committees... and buildings. About buildings most of all.

All these things, though, are tools. They are tools for ministry. They are things you use in order to accomplish something more important. When you swing a hammer to build some shelves in your basement, it's the shelves that matter, not the hammer. In the church, we get that reversed all the time. So for us, it's loving fellowship, discipleship, worship, following our call to ministry, evangelism, unity, and helping others that really matter, not the structures.

Now, you're not going to be able to build those shelves without a hammer. And we're not going to be able to do ministry without some of these structures and such. But it's the ministry that matters, not the tools. Good tools help. And we've tried to modify our tools, our structures, to make them as helpful for ministry as we can. But it's all about the ministry. It's a privilege to serve Him with you.

GUILD SERVICE PROJECT






The Guild is holding a Lenten Service project through the month of March collecting items for the New Hope Pregnancy Resource Center in Westwood.

What is Lent?

The word *Lent* is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word for springtime, which literally translates in modern English to "the lengthening of the days." In the early church, the Lenten period was used as a time for preparing new converts for Baptism on Easter Sunday. Today it is a time for preparation, reflection, growth, and change. The liturgical color for Lent is purple, a solemn color, a color for royalty and repentance. The liturgical color for Easter Sunday and the Sundays between Easter and Pentecost is white, signifying purity.
