Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This past Sunday we were talking together about how Christians, without a good knowledge of Scripture, can lead each other astray. I used, as an example, our denomination, The Reformed Church in America. 29%, or something like that, of our churches have recently left the denomination, largely, though not totally, over issues of human sexuality. I mentioned that issues of sexuality



don't dominate the pages of Scripture, but we treat them like they do. Yet issues of unity and togetherness, and the humility and gentleness they require, are found over and over again in the Bible. And I said that, because folks didn't have a complete understanding of Scripture, they overemphasized sexuality issues and deemphasized unity issues. And when they led their churches out of the denomination, they misled a lot of Christians in their churches.

That's all correct, insofar as it goes. But it's a bit more nuanced and complicated. It makes it sound as if conservatives are at fault for the disunity our denomination has experienced. While that's partly true, it's not completely true. Part of the issue that conservative churches have had with the RCA is also over the ordination of women. From 1980 to 2012, we had as part of the Book of Church Order two conscience clauses, dealing with the ordination of women to church offices. The first dealt with the ordination of women as Ministers of Word and Sacrament. The second dealt with the ordination of women to all church offices, including deacon and elder. Here's what it said: "Ministers of the Word shall not be pressured in such a way as to lead either one who supports or one who opposes, on scriptural grounds, the ordination of women to church offices to offend against his or her conscience. Nor shall any church member be penalized for conscientious objection to, or support of, the ordination of women to church offices. Nor shall any minister of the Word or church member obstruct by unconstitutional means the election, ordination, or installation of a woman to church offices."

The intent was this: if you looked at Scripture and found legitimate objections to the ordination of women (or also the opposite), you couldn't be penalized for that. This had the practical effect of protecting more conservative folks in our denomination. In other words, it was saying, "You fit. Even as we take a position different from yours, there is a place for you in this big tent of what it means to be Reformed."

In 2012, the "lefter" wing of the RCA moved to do away with the conscience clauses, which was done. That had the effect of saying, "If you're a biblical conservative and oppose women's ordination, you no longer fit." To be frank, though I support women's ordination, I thought at the time that was a huge mistake. We were telling some significant portion of the Reformed Church that there was no place for them here. The effect of that change, pushed by more liberal folks in our denomination, can't be underestimated. It probably wasn't determinative in all those churches leaving, but it played a significant role. It fits neatly into the conservative narrative, both within and outside of the church that, "We're tired of these liberals telling us how to live, and what's right and wrong." (cont.)

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Okay, that was a lot of context. Here's my point. Things are rarely cut and dried. If we're going to live together in and out of the church, we have to make allowances for each other. We need to make sure everybody knows there's a place for them, and they fit. We have to show gentleness and humility with each other. When we fail to do that, we create raw, wounded emotions. Decisions like leaving the denomination in which not only you were



raised, but also your parents, and maybe your grandparents and great-grandparents, are not likely the product of systematic thought (I disagree with such and such a stand of the RCA). Rather, they are the result of emotions – "I don't fit here anymore. This denomination (or organization, community, or country) has left me behind and it hurts." There's a sensitivity and empathy we need to cultivate in order to nurture unity and oneness.

By the way, you have shown a great deal of sensitivity, gentleness, and humility with me, and I'm very grateful for that. It's a privilege to serve Him with you.
