

#### Dear Friends at CCHP,

Janet and I are always deeply saddened whenever we receive "The Courier" sharing news that another member of the CCHP family has died. Sadly, it seems, this has been an all-too-frequent occurrence since Janet and I left HP back in 2013. Most recently, with the deaths of Wini Kinkele and Dot Abelman, the two of us are once again experiencing a sense of sadness and loss with their passing. Because we were unable to attend the memorial services for Wini and Dot, and because they meant so very much to us, I felt compelled to share a few of my own personal reflections about each of them.

Let me begin with Wini. Everyone who knew Wini loved her. She was cheerful and fun to be around. She wore a constant smile and never had a critical word to say about anyone. Wini served at my side during my 20-year tenure at CCHP as the clerk of consistory. She also filled in for Lori as the office administrator whenever Lori was away. Wini was the CCHP wedding coordinator for many years and was actively engaged in the Women's Guild. She attended Bible studies and worship regularly. Along with all of you, Janet and I shall always remember Wini with great fondness. Wini loved the Lord and because she did, the words of the psalmist come to mind, "The righteous shall be held in everlasting remembrance" (Psalm 112:6) as Wini surely will be.



Dot Abelman was also a fine woman and dear friend. She too was a devoted servant of Christ and a loyal member of the CCHP family. She was, as you know, a member of the church staff for well over 40 years. Dot worked primarily in the church's musical ministry as organist, chancel, cherub and chime choir director and as bell choir director, the ministry she cherished most dearly. She was also actively engaged in the Women's Guild and co-chaired, along with Val Hill, the Women's Guild Bazaar for many years. We all shall miss her. We commend both of these dear ladies into the hands of Almighty God.

Remembering these two dear women got me thinking about all of the many wonderful servants of Christ who have gone home to be with Jesus since Janet and I departed CCHP in 2013. I asked Lori if she could provide me with a list of the members of the CCHP family who died since our departure. I was taken aback to see how many familiar names were on it--a total of 28 dear friends, all active members of the congregation! Faithful servants of Christ who helped to make CCHP the truly wonderful congregation it is. We miss them all.

Being reminded of these fine individuals got me to thinking about three things--reunions, banquets and celebrations. Reunions are a time when people are reunited with old friends or family. There's one reunion that will be the best reunion of all--the reunion we'll all one day share in heaven. We'll see Jesus and be reunited with all of our dear friends and saints who have gone ahead. We'll sit at a table together and enjoy a marvelous banquet feast. Jesus will be our host and set before us will be a luscious buffet of delicious foods. It shall be a glorious celebration, a victorious homecoming where we shall laugh and rejoice, uniting our voices to sing the Lord's praise.

Today, as we mourn the passing of Wini, Dot, and so many others, let us remember the words of the Apostle Paul who said, "We do not grieve as others do who have no hope, for since we believe Jesus died and rose again even so through Jesus God will bring with him all those who have fallen asleep."

Let us hold fast to this marvelous promise as we look ahead in hope to Jesus and to that glorious day in the future when we shall all be gathered in heaven in Jesus' presence, reunited with all the faithful saints who have gone ahead, sharing in a marvelous banquet feast and a grand and glorious victory celebration together. Just think about how truly grand and marvelous it will be!

Thanks be to God for this glorious hope we have through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Lord!



Summer Bible Study... Did you know that there is a book in the Old Testament that is sometimes called the Fifth Gospel? Why? Because there are so many references in it to the coming Messiah and to the suffering He would endure for you and for me. This "Fifth Gospel" is the book written by the prophet Isaiah.


We will not study the entire book, but we will look at how to understand the poetic style of writing, how to see the book in relation to the complexity of the time period, how the book pictures the coming Messiah, and how there is a prophetic message for us in the book (as it was in the time of Isaiah), both a warning and an encouragement. And, of course, how the book of Isaiah can help us learn to wait upon God for strength. And give us His peace. (Isaiah 26:3)

The Bible Study will begin the week of July 7 and will be held for 5 weeks. The Zoom study will be held on Tuesday evenings, beginning at 7:30. The in-person study will be held on Thursday mornings, beginning at 10:00 am. We welcome all to join one of these studies. You can shift between groups as you need to. The sign-up sheet is in the Narthex.

Pastor Zach will be leading an additional Bible study on the book of Ruth.

It will take place in the Johnson Chapel on Sundays after worship beginning on June 22nd at 11:15 AM and going through July 13th.

#### **Love Lifts Us Up**

Each year CCHP tithes 10% of the previous year's income to benevolent giving. Each month we send donations to different organizations that the outreach committee has deemed worthy of those donations. This

month we will be sending our benevolent check to Love Lifts Us Up—a non-profit organization begun by our Pastor Emeritus, the Rev. George Kaden.

Since 2017 LLUU provides ongoing/real time assistance to underserved families of newborns and seriously ill children during a hospital admission and those requiring support upon discharge. More than 800 families have received assistance to date.

Some of the donations are used to provide transportation fees to visit children, prescription medication, required medical equipment and assistance in payment of pediatric funeral expenses.

They also collect items such as diapers, burp cloths, blankets, formula, Pack 'N Play or infant sleepers, food store gift cards, new infant car seats, among many other things.

### Mescalero Reformed Church

Mescalero Reformed Church is another one of our missions that we support. It is nestled in the mountains of south-central New Mexico. Here, children chase each

other in front of the church and stir up dust as they race around, laughing. This is a safe place for them to just be kids. Between the afterschool programming, youth group, and the busy summer VBS and community activities, the church is often a beacon of light in the beautiful land of the Mescalero Apache Tribe. Many in this tribe are plagued by alcohol and substance abuse, family dysfunction, and poverty with seemingly little hope of escape.

Mescalero is richly blessed with a wonderful cultural heritage. Mescalero Reformed Church ministers to the community in a way that honors their Native American heritage and demonstrates how that heritage shapes their faith. Integrating Mescalero's cultural heritage is key for effective ministry. The church is currently led by their consistory as they search for a pastor.

Fathers' Day is the third Sunday in June set aside to honor fathers. Credit for originating the holiday is generally given to Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, whose father, a Civil War veteran, raised her and her five siblings after their mother died in childbirth. She is said to have had the idea in 1909 while listening to a sermon on Mothers' Day, which at the time was becoming established as a holiday. Local religious leaders supported the idea, and the first Fathers' Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, the month of the birthday of Dodd's father. In 1924 U.S. Pres. Calvin Coolidge gave his support to the observance, and in 1966 Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson issued a proclamation that recognized the day. It became a national holiday in 1972, when Pres. Richard Nixon signed legislation designating the third Sunday of June as Father's Day.
